'Stop Great Cransley Wind Farm'

Sunday 21st September saw the first meeting held at The Centre At Mawsley (TCAM) to stop the Great Cransley Wind Farm. Over 200 concerned residents from the surrounding villages were keen to learn the truth about this wind farm proposal.

The highlight of the meeting was the speaker, Mike Barnard, who is an authority on wind farm developments. Mike was involved in successfully stopping the proposal at Boxworth in Cambridgeshire. During that campaign, he gained an enormous amount of knowledge and expertise and has proceeded to assist with 16 other campaigns.

Mike identified many issues regarding our particular scheme and left us all in no doubt as to the likely impact on the surrounding area should the proposal go ahead.

He also spoke about the relative merits of wind energy generation. He is not opposed to wind power. However, he believes that the current, very large government subsidies applied to developing wind farms enable developers to make significant profits on unsuitable sites that do not have adequate average wind speeds and therefore will require long term subsidies.

More generally, he questioned why some leading countries in wind farm technology over the last 10 years have now either reduced or withdrawn funding from further wind farm development.

Der Spiegel, the German newspaper, recently reported ... "In Germany the dream of environmentally friendly energy has resulted in the subsidised destruction of the countryside."

The main points he highlighted about the Great Cransley site are:

- This site has not been identified for its suitability as a wind farm but by the landowner's willingness to make the land available.

- Inappropriate size of the site; it is too small to satisfactorily accommodate 4 turbines.

- The existence of bridleways across

the site means that the location of the turbines will contravene current guidelines.

- National data deems this area to be one of low wind speed and therefore inappropriate for wind farm development. Hence the planning application will be four turbines 100ft higher than Burton Wold, at 125m to address these shortcomings.

- An industrial development in a rural environment is an excessive degradation of the landscape.

- The proposal will have a material and diverse impact on the landscape by virtue of its height, size and prominence in relation to the significant number of residential properties.

- 4 out of 6 planning applications are rejected due to strong well co-ordinated local campaigns involving ALL of the villages surrounding a particular site.

- Developers are likely to minimise the effects on health which are now being recognised as being associated with wind farms.

- **WE CAN WIN...** we need to get together, we must not leave it to the few as this will reduce our chances of success.

Petition

99% of residents who attended the meeting signed the petition against the wind farm. If you would like to support the campaign, the petition will be available to sign at The Centre.

NORTHAMPTONSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL

At County Hall we continue to modernise and improve the way the Council operates and serves the people of Northamptonshire. It goes without saying that the current economic downturn will undoubtedly prove to be a massive challenge, but I am confident that the changes we have made will help ensure that the Council is well placed to deal with an uncertain future without putting an unnecessary burden on local taxpayers.

The recently published annual audit letter clearly set out how our decisions have made a positive and constructive difference to the way the council operates and to the services we deliver. There are still areas that need to improve, and addressing these will be central to our work over the coming year.

Last month saw the publication of our third annual report to the people which sets out what the County Council has achieved over the last twelve months. I would like to encourage people to read it, as we can all be proud of what the Council has achieved and how it is now delivering efficient and flexible local services that best meet local needs.

For example, culture in the County continues to be supported and promoted by the Administration, and our library service continues to deliver excellence and innovation. In addition to the introduction of new technology that has enabled libraries to be open an extra 431 hours per week, all 36 libraries will now be selling the specially-designed 'it's my bag' jute bags in an effort to cut down on the number of disposable plastic bags used and thrown away in the county.

I have always made time to undertake tours of Kettering Rural Villages with various senior council officers. I always find these tours both enjoyable and useful as it not only gives me the opportunity to see at first hand those things which you feel need addressing, but they also give a chance for people to speak to their County Councillor and Senior Council officers directly in an informal way. During my recent visit to Mawsley, I was able to see at first hand, many of the issues regarding signage and street lighting that need addressing. Officers at County Hall are currently dealing with these issues and I am confident they will be addressed soon.

The problems around adoption of the roads and footpaths are still difficult to resolve as we need the house builders to complete them before the Council is able to take them over. I am working with Councillors Victoria Perry and Jim Hakewill and with Mawsley Parish Council to try to resolve this as quickly as possible.

Although the Council faces many challenges, I am, as always, also keen to try to help with any individual problems or issues you may have with County services. Please get in touch and I will try to help to get them resolved.

Anti-social behaviour

Anti-social behaviour can be many things, but can be defined as behaviour which causes or is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to one or more people who are not of the same household.

This might include: intimidating behaviour; dropping litter; threatening or abusive language; graffiti; habitually gathering in large groups; kicking balls at people or buildings; drinking or being drunk in the street; hanging around on play equipment that is meant for younger children; being in a play area that has a 'dusk to dawn' restriction; playing loud music; or any behaviour which causes or is likely to cause anyone a fear of anticipated danger, trouble, pain, hardship or persecution.

What can we do about it?

Officers in Kettering Rural West are working hard to deal with the issues of anti-social behaviour that are happening in some parts of the parishes.

One of the actions we are taking is to monitor all of the Stop and Searches that our officers make. If an individual has been found to be acting in an anti-social manner, than we will send a warning letter - either direct to the person stopped, or, if the person spoken to is under 18, to their parents. The warning letter we send is the first step in a series of actions that could lead to an Acceptable Behaviour Contract or Anti-Social Behaviour Order (ASBO).

Parents who receive a letter about their child's behaviour are often not aware of where their child has been or what they have been doing on a particular occasion, and most of the time, the letter will be enough to prevent the behaviour happening again. If the letter doesn't work (we only send it once) and the same person comes to our attention again within a three month period, then we will ask the individual concerned, and parents if they are under 18, to meet with local officers. We will then ask them to consider and agree to sign an Acceptable Behaviour Agreement. This is an informal agreement, where the individual agrees to a series of 'rules' about their future actions and behaviour. For example, they may agree not to hang around a particular location or with a certain group of people, depending on the type of anti-social behaviour they have been involved in. This agreement is not compulsory, but if it is refused or breached, we will start the process for an Acceptable Behaviour Contract (ABC), which is more formal, has legal implications and if it not complied with, may lead to an Anti-Social Behaviour Order.

SmartWater

Our homes and the property inside them are invaluable to us. Locking doors, windows and installing alarms are the obvious ways to help protect your home, but there is a new preventative measure that can also help identify the offender.



SmartWater is a high-tech crime reduction tool that has been shown to be an invisible weapon in reducing burglaries.

Each SmartWater kit has a unique genetic code that links the marked items to a particular home. It is an odourless and colourless liquid and because it is only visible under ultra violet light, it can be used to mark property from jewellery to computers, anything with a hard surface. Once marked, the item carries a unique signature that allows stolen property to be identified and returned to its rightful owner. And only a tiny quantity is needed to identify the unique code and return stolen property or link a criminal to a crime.

Every marking kit contains window stickers that will act as a clear message to any potential burglar that the property inside is protected by SmartWater.

Tree planting

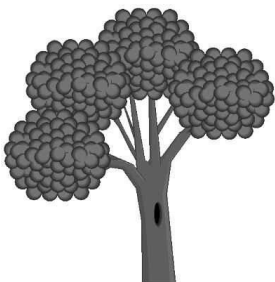

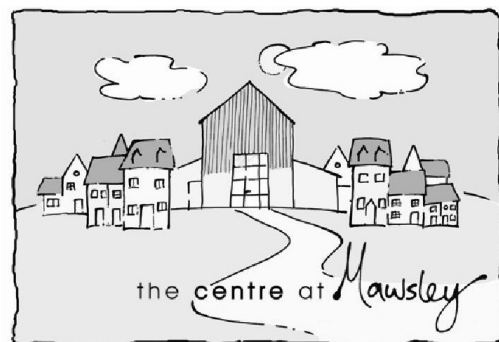

I am very pleased with the team as they start this new season. We have got our first win under our belts under stiff competition and hope we can build on that.

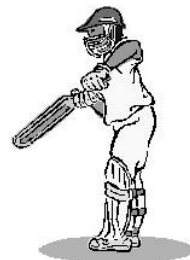

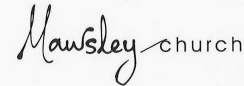
