	Whilst there is no church building, there is a growing Church Community which meets at The Centre in Mawsley. Led by the Church of England it is open to and attended by people of all denominations. Services are informal with a particular emphasis on families.	
	Services are held every week. Typical attendance is c. 25 adults and c. 25 children. The 1st Sunday of each month is a café-style church; this is focussed on inviting	
	people in. On the 2nd & 4th Sundays, in addition to services, there are children's groups. 3rd Sundays is a service for all ages.	
	There are a number of mid-week meetings including three groups engaging with the new Pilgrim Course about Christian discipleship. The Church publicises its activities via its own FaceBook page and website	
	(currently being re-constructed); and the village Newsletter. The Church runs the Baby & Toddler Group (on behalf of the Mawsley Villagers Association) at The Centre at Mawsley each term-time week. This is publicised	
	via its own FaceBook page, which is linked to the Church's own website, and updated weekly. Close links are maintained with the village health visitor, who will identify any parent / guardian who would value the social links that the Group brings. In such instances a member of the Group will normally contact the adult concerned to invite them along; as well as making them aware of the Group it	
	also ensures they do not arrive and be faced with a room full of people they do not know.

	• The annual Village Fete is a large-scale event which attracts over 1000	





people each year. It involves most of the village's groups / clubs, who have a stall to raise funds and in some cases do exhibitions / demonstrations.

- Bonfire Night is also a large-scale event. 936 adult tickets were sold last year and children go free (estimated c. 400).
- The Beer Festival is held at The Centre at Mawsley; it has evolved into a stand-alone Cask Ale Festival, which will be held twice in 2015.

	The Mawsley Amateur Dramatic Society puts on 3 performances each year, including a pantomime. The Community Choir is going from strength to strength and has recently won a number of awards at Choir competitions. Also there are a number of art-based groups, including 25 dance classes; water colour classes; Infants Music Makers and a Book Club.	
	History / Heritage:	
	As the village is only 12 years old there is little village history to feature.	
	However the village Newsletter often features articles on the history of the surrounding area.

	During the development of the village every new resident received a welcome pack and usually a personal welcome visit from a volunteer member of the Mawsley Villagers Association.	
	This has now been revived and with effect from April this year new residents will be given an updated welcome pack. This has been developed by, and ongoing distribution will be managed by, the MVA.

	New residents will be located by a number of means:

	Also the village newsletter is produced every 2 months and delivered to every household, so any new resident will soon realise the welcome that awaits them plus the range of activities and facilities that the village can offer them.	
	The Coffee Club operates an informal process whereby any older people who are new to the village are invited to join the Club.

	To attract visitors major village events are advertised outside the village, e.g. by banners on the A43 roundabout.	
	A Wedding Fayre is held at The Centre at Mawsley each year.	
	There are a series of websites; accessed via a Mawsley village web portal (see Section 7 Q 1). In addition The Centre at Mawsley is currently developing a micro-website (i.e. embedded within its main site) to publicise and promote The Centre as an affordable wedding venue to intending couples in the surrounding area.	
	Within the six Mawsley FaceBook sites there is one that focuses on village life generally, and one that covers events / activities etc. at The Centre at Mawsley. FaceBook is used to attract members to both Mawsley Choir and the Line Dancing group from nearby villages.	
	As outlined in Section 2 Q3 the village's extensive sports facilities are shared with the cricket and football clubs from adjoining villages.

The MVA has raised with the Parish Council the issue of some form of decorative village sign to go at the village entrances; this concept will be pursued jointly by both parties over the coming months.

There is also a large public noticeboard, situated within The Centre at Mawsley; this is sub-divided into sections which are allocated to village groups and clubs. Additionally there is a display box in The Centre at Mawsley for flyers etc. for local events and activities.

However this has been delayed due to the apparent inability of Kettering Borough Council to confirm that it is now in their ownership; we will need to get permission and a licence or lease from them.</li> <li>It should be noted that the older children play area, skate park, ball court and BMX track were all funded by the village's own efforts and grant-raising, led by The Mawsley Villagers Association, at a total cost of £70,000.</li> <li>We have recently completed a "quiet area" (as there is no churchyard for people to sit in to remember lost loved ones) and memorial within the village green area, funded from within the village. This is the location for the Remembrance Sunday service, which is attended by over 100 villagers.</li> </ul>

This is also facilitated by Mawsley's FaceBook page called "Mawsley Buddies", which was set up specifically to be a process whereby people in the village could call on other villagers for help /advice etc Moreover the village does have a regular bus service; hourly each way between Kettering and Northampton. Services run until 19:00 from Kettering to Mawsley.

Yes       ✓         Yes, please give details         The Mawsley Villagers Association (MVA):         A registered charity (no. 1117458) that was set up from the very earliest days of         the village's development. Its role is to develop and promote social facilities and         events; to encourage a sense of community; to make Mawsley an enjoyable and         inclusive place to live. Until Mawsley Parish Council was formed in 2007 (prior to         then it was a part of Cransley Parish) it also undertook many of the roles of a	





parish council, often working with Cransley PC.

The MVA is run entirely by volunteers. There are 5 main sub-groups:

- The Centre at Mawsley Community Interest Company (The Centre is the trading arm of the charity)
- Under 5s group; which, with the help of the Church, runs a Baby & Toddler session once/week in term time
- Youth Club: which, runs the Club once/week in term time
- Website: development and content
- Newsletter publication

Since its inception in 2002 the MVA has raised the money to be able to grant over £45,000 (plus obtaining a further £65,000 from grants by external organisations) to the village. Beneficiaries have included:

- The Centre at Mawsley
- Every village group / club
- Individuals (to support personal development)
- The Youth Club
- The older children's play area / skate ramps / ball court / BMX track
- Fencing around the younger children play area
- Mawsley Amateur Dramatics
- Easter Egg Hunt (over a number of years)
- Children's Christmas party (over a number of years)

The developers, as a part of their S106 commitments, set up a Community Fund for the village. Its purpose is to help fund the social development and facilities of the village. The fund is managed by the Parish Council. Any village group or non-commercial organisation can apply for a grant from the Fund, which will contribute up to 75% of the cost of an appropriate (i.e. of benefit to the village) project (85% re The Centre at Mawsley). Grants have included:

However the Parish Council has started the process to develop a Neighbourhood Plan; the area designation has been submitted to Kettering Council and is currently in the public consultation phase.	
6b.	Has your village identified any infrastructure or housing needs for the community? If so have any of these been actioned? The Parish Council has recently considered proposals for some land, the use for which has yet to be allocated, to be made available for community housing for older people. This is targeted at encouraging older residents who are no longer able to maintain their own home to move to sheltered accommodation within the village rather than have to move out; and also at older people who wish to move into the village to be close to their relatives who are already residents here. The Parish Council has been through an extensive process to try get to such accommodation. This entailed a number of meetings with the land-owner, who prepared plans for the site, which were refined during the course of these meetings. However when we raised the issue with Kettering Council Planning Dept. they made it clear that they would not agree to this as this site is allocated to leisure/community use. The project is currently stalled as there is no other suitable site in the village. However Kettering Council's draft 5 year Housing Strategy makes provision for a small-scale (50-70 houses) extension of Mawsley. When this goes ahead the Parish Council will press for some community housing for older people to be included.



2.	How do local businesses support community life, beyond offering employment?	
	E.g. sponsorship of local events or village activities.	
	<ul> <li>The Centre at Mawsley, albeit owned and run by the village, is nonetheless a local business. Its ethos and purpose is to be the central point of the village community, whilst still operating as a commercial business. To that end it hosts a wide range of community groups /clubs etc in fact the first 21 listed in Section 1 Q1. The room hire rates for these local groups are significantly below cost to The Centre; to charge full cost recovery would not be affordable for most groups, and hence they would no longer be viable. The substantial losses made as a result of this are offset by running the bar / lounge on a proper commercial basis. As there is no pub in the village, and there never will be, this again is an instance of the village community coming together to create facilities for the village. The main hall and meeting room at The Centre enable villagers to hold children's and adults' parties, discos, weddings, christenings etc. within the village. Indeed in 2014 there were 94 such events; the vast majority of which were for people in the village. Furthermore, as outlined in Section 2 Q3, there will be an additional 70 events in 2015.</li> <li>Horts Estate Agents have made a generous contribution towards the cost of a major affle prize for the village fete for each of the last 3 years.</li> <li>The dentist is also the main sponsor for Touch Rugby.</li> <li>India2Mawsley restaurant &amp; take-way sponsors the village Rounders and Youth football teams by paying for their kit.</li> <li>A local electrical contractor supplied extensive consultancy FOC to vibrate the former supplied extensive consultancy FOC to</li> </ul>

The village recognises the need for further facilities for older children and so a project has been set up, jointly by the Parish Council and the MVA, to identify what those requirements might be; this of course includes representatives from the older children. This will then lead into a project to meet those requirements, including, where necessary, raising funds.

- Currently 5 of the 7 Parish Councillors are older
- 5 older people currently regularly do reading at the school
- The Coffee Club, which is targeted at, but not confined to, the retired and has more than 60 members, runs days out / visits (e.g. plans for 2015 include a Downton Experience, visits to Drayton House and Lowick, and a trip to the seaside) and usually has guest speakers to its monthly meetings.
- The Last of the Summer Wine Club is a group of mainly retired and mainly men who do maintenance and small-scale building work (e.g. bike shelter; fence repairs; renovation and on-going maintenance of the pond and its surround) around the village on a voluntary basis.
- Some of the trustees of the Mawsley Villagers Association are older people.
- The Centre at Mawsley Community Interest Company features 2 older people as part of the management team.
