Mawsley Villagers Association is looking for new members

The Mawsley Villagers Association (MVA) held its Annual General Meeting in March. The meeting reflected on another successful year during which the charity has supported village groups and organised events.

The annual firework display was once again a well-organised, very successful event. It is organised by the MVA, with members providing significant time and expertise, and the event is now recognised as the best local display, attended by thousands of people. The MVA also helped the toddlers group get back on its feet following a difficult period. However, not everything was successful; attempts to get the woodland path refurbished met with numerous difficulties not least a lack of funds in NNC.

During the year the MVA renegotiated a new lease with Mawsley Parish Council for the management of the Community Centre, which the MVA operates through TCAM, a Community Interest Company. The new lease is valid to 2034.

After 12 years active service with the MVA Steve Thorpe stood down as Chairman. He was warmly thanked by all the members for his support and help over many years. He is replaced by Jenny Clucas who was elected as Chair. Jenny is now seeking new members to join the MVA and help continue its good work for Mawsley residents.

Young Visionaries Proposal for a Revamped Skate Ramp in Mawsley

In a bid to rejuvenate Mawsley's skate ramp facilities, a group of determined young enthusiasts is spearheading a local initiative.

Last year saw the removal of the small half-pipe ramp due to irreparable damage, and the larger one teeters on the brink of demolition due to financial constraints. Even the once-beloved pump track, while suitable for muddy escapades, fails to meet the standards for exhilarating rides during many months of the year. Undeterred by these challenges, Reggie, Jacob, Alfie, Tom, Ethan, Grayson, and Fynn, all aged 11, have emerged as the driving force behind the initiative. Armed with ambition and determination to improve their tailwhips and air walks, the scooting enthusiasts embarked on a journey of research, community engagement, and strategic planning.



Their efforts culminated in a proposal presented to the Parish Council at its monthly meeting in March. Drawing inspiration from neighbouring parks and identifying potential support from local businesses and residents, the boys crafted a vision that promises inclusivity and long-term viability. Central to their proposal is a design that caters to both novice riders and seasoned skaters, ensuring that the revamped skate park becomes a vibrant hub of activity for the entire community. Moreover, their survey of over 100 people revealed fantastic demand for improved facilities, with 99% of respondents voicing their support.

The response from the Parish Council was overwhelmingly positive. The boys have since wasted no time in initiating grassroots fundraising efforts as they gear up for the table-top sale in May. They also extend an invitation for community involvement, urging support for their fundraising endeavours. Whether through donations, volunteerism, or innovative fundraising ideas, every contribution would be gratefully received.

Spring is definitely the time for new beginnings - so come along to our next meeting and see what our modern village WI is like. We are a friendly bunch aiming to provide an outlet for women to socialise safely, make new friends, and learn new skills and hobbies.

Did you know that you can join the WI from age 18 and 16-year-olds (+) can come along as visitors, so all you daughters out there can drag your mum along and enjoy a night out together. The WI offers inspiration and is a national organisation with a lot of influence on subjects that affect the nation as a whole - so our members can promote campaigns and become influencers from an early age,

The emphasis of the WI is education, so from January 2024 an *online learning hub* was introduced - so you can now take courses at home – most of which are free to members (and a small charge for non-members). Flexibility is key as courses are available regardless of disposable income, geographical location, accessibility requirements or financial and time constraints. There are live courses; on demand courses; anytime access and study courses each offering an array of topics within the following categories - *creative craft; exercise & wellbeing; talks & interests; business & training, technology.* For example, in April there are beginners' courses in Sign Language; Computer Programming; Wellness Meditation; Crocheting; Sewing; Quilting and mobile photography. More courses will be added each month as the hub progresses.



News from Team TCAM

THE TEAM have been welcoming many new faces at the Centre recently and report that the main hall has remained busy with user groups, events, craft fairs, concerts, parties, and the list goes on! It is also great to see so many football teams using the adjacent pitches (weather and ground conditions permitting). The games create a great atmosphere around the sports field and introduce new faces to the Centre to purchase hot and cold drinks and, occasionally, something a little stronger.

The final touches to complete the bar renovations will be the placing of pictures, some of which will have acoustic backing to help reduce the noise level. Many of the pictures are some of the great photographs taken by Duncan Webster and we are extremely grateful to him for allowing their use.

As and when finances permit it is our intention to extend the patio area to accommodate more benches and replace the existing benches with a composite material that will be far more serviceable than wood.

Regular users of the Centre will be aware that it is in use by multiple groups or individuals and our aim is to ensure that everyone feels safe within the building. Organisers of functions and groups that include children, defined as people of age 17 and under, are responsible for such children attending those events. It is annoying to users of the bar, for example, if children are running around the corridor seemingly without adequate supervision and becoming a nuisance to others. People hiring the hall sign the TCAM User Agreement which stipulates that children are supervised at all times whilst attending events in the hall and other areas of the premises. Team TCAM thank you for your understanding of this requirement and its necessity for the safety of all users.




We celebrated Chinese New Year – when Beavers and Cubs made red envelopes and paper lanterns.

Nature on your Doorstep - Springtime Wild Flowers

Wild Primroses

Although flowering from February to May, April is the prime time to see Wild Primroses looking their flashy best. We always take a stroll along the Brampton Valley Way towards Kelmarsh about now to see one of the best local shows on the banks either side of the south tunnel entrance.





Wood Violet

Commonly found on hedge banks and shady woods. Flowering in April to May. They also grow in Mawsley near the Broughton entrance to the village and under some hedge rows. A beautiful little plant but sometimes tricky to spot in longer grass as it is very low growing.

Cow Parsley

This is one of the commonest plants flowering between April and May on road side verges. You can't walk very far up a local lane without spotting this tall exuberant wild flower. It is a member of the carrot family of plants but apparently tastes nothing like carrots. Please note we don't recommend you try tasting it.





Blue Bells

A walk in a wood in mid April to May and coming across a large area of flowering bluebells is a sight never to be forgotten. We are very privileged in that about 50% of all wild bluebells in the world are found in the UK. The sweet smelling bell shaped flowers carpet the ground of old woodland areas. An important food source for nectar loving insects. The wooded areas around Desborough are a good place to find them.

Ramsons (Wild Garlic)

In April till June these plants with broad pointed leaves and white flowers smell of garlic when crushed and often carpet the woodland floor much like bluebells. If you are looking for Ramsons the chances are you will smell the romance-repelling garlic pong wafting through the woods before you see it. Try walking round Harrington village you may spot/smell them there.





Forget-me-not

Two species of this lovely sky-blue flowered plant are are found growing in the UK. The Water Forget-me-not grows on the banks of rivers, streams and ponds and has a larger flower than that of the Common or Field Forget-me-not found in fields, hedgerows and waste land. These pretty little plants can be seen from April right through to September. Take a stroll along the footpath from Mawsley to Old and try to find both varieties in the field edge and around the dew ponds.


Bye the way we're not foragers so we don't eat any thing found in the wild. If you are interested however, there is a courses available run by experts.

IN YOUR POCKET

Who discovered the secrets of radio communication that is at the heart of this technology?

Many science books claim that the Scottish mathematical physicist, James Clerk Maxwell was the person most responsible for the theoretical foundation for electromagnetic waves (radio waves are part of the spectrum of such waves) in the 1860's.


Maxwell's theory was confirmed by German scientist, Heinrich Rudolf Hertz and it was not long before the possibility of using radio waves to communicate, without the use of wires, between sender and receiver was realised.

Guglielmo Marconi, an Italian inventor soon realised the military and commercial possibilities of this new type of communication. In 1895, Marconi used radio waves to transmit signals over a distance of several kilometres. Marconi also made the first shore to ship communication and in March 1899 made a transmission across the English Channel from Wimereux, near Boulogne France to the South Foreland Lighthouse near Dover, Kent.

The new wireless telegraphy equipment installed on the RMS Titanic helped save over 700 lives. The number could have been significantly more had properly controlled emergency communication protocols been introduced. By 1912, the date of the Titanic disaster, most passenger ships operating in the north Atlantic had radio installations staffed by Marconi Company operators. The Cunard passenger ship RMS Carpathia picked up the emergency transmissions from the Titanic and raced to the rescue.

The development of radio communication developed rapidly and in the early 1920s both the Marconi company and the Bell Laboratories were testing car-based telephone systems. In the UK, the British Broadcasting Company (later to become a corporation) began to experiment with radio broadcasting and, on 14th November 1922 the BBC began daily radio broadcasts from a transmitter in the Strand, London. Stations in other cities of the UK followed rapidly.

Further advances were made and equipment, both for receiving and transmitting became more compact, particularly so with the development of the transistor, followed by integrated circuits and micro-chips.



The Radio equipment on board RMS Titanic was housed in three rooms and the wire antenna (aerial) was of a 'T' configuration consisting of a 50-metre vertical section and four 120-metre wires strung between the two masts, around half a mile of wire (805 metres)!

The aerial in your smart phone is a few centimetres long.

For most radio communication today the transmitter and receiver are incorporated in one unit, a transceiver. For day-to-day radio communication considerably higher frequencies are used now than in the early years — a higher frequency equals a shorter wavelength. Broadcasters now predominantly use Very High Frequency bands (VHF) for radio and Ultra High Frequency (UHF) for television. So, the next time you use your smart phone think of those early pioneers of radio whose discoveries made it all possible!
