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### **Mawsley Parish Council Elections**

Every four years all Parish Councillors stand down. This will happen in May this year when all seven seats on Mawsley Parish Council will become vacant and open for election on 7th May. Full details will be published in the next 'News & Views' but we include here an outline of the process and requirements to assist any of you who are considering standing for election.

Who can be a Councillor?

To stand for election you must be at least 18 years old, be on the electoral register and either have been resident here or within 3 miles of here, or worked here for the past year. There are also citizenship requirements.


### First Steps

### **EVENTS CALENDAR**

This took place on the 7<sup>th</sup> December. The full minutes are available on the MVA website but there are a couple of agenda items that are worth highlighting:

- It was acknowledged that the structure of the MVA and TCAM boards is somewhat complex and that this might put some villagers off the idea of becoming involved. However, the structure is a necessary bugbear if village assets and the management of The Centre are to run with efficiency and propriety. After all, The Centre is not merely a Village Hall, but a dynamic not-for-profit business established for the benefit of all of us.
- The MVA is aware that its communication with villagers could be improved, despite the fact that minutes of all of our meetings are published on the MVA website. To this end, a Mawsley Special Delivery flier will shortly be circulated to all households. It will include invitations to take part in discussions on the development of The Centre and how to accommodate our growing adolescent population. There will also be an invitation to run your own village event with the offer of funding support.

The MVA would like more feedback on the future of the village so what do you think are the issues facing Mawsley? Your thoughts and ideas are valuable to us.

# **Mawsley Parish Council**

In the September/October News & Views the Parish Council talked about current spending, and the timetable for setting the 2015-16 budget. This culminates in the budget, and therefore also the precept, being determined at our meeting on the 19<sup>th</sup> January.

As the major area of expenditure for the Parish Council relates to The Centre it would be useful to explain again exactly what the Parish Council's relationship with The Centre is. There are four aspects:

**1.** The Parish Council owns the building and is therefore the landlord. It is leased to the MVA (a copy of the lease is now on the Parish Council website). We work closely with the MVA and TCAM to ensure the building is kept in good condition. In addition there is a formal annual landlord's inspection, and any necessary maintenance or remedial work is agreed between us; responsibility for carrying this out/paying for it being as per the terms of the lease.

As we have explained before this is a very expensive building to maintain. We will agree the maintenance budget on the  $19^{th}$ , but the Council is likely to allocate c. £10,000.

**2. To help cover The Centre's annual losses.** Not only expensive to maintain, but also expensive to run. The Parish Council has discussed the business model with TCAM on many occasions and is satisfied that the current approach is the best way; it is not - and cannot be - a village hall, where users collect the key from Albert or Nelly.

Nonetheless we all recognise that currently it makes a loss each year; and that loss has to be covered in some way. Let's be clear where this loss arises; it is on provision of facilities for the Community. The costs of these are far higher than user groups (e.g. Scouts; Line Dancing; Youth Club etc. etc.) could ever afford to pay.

Let's be clear also; the bar makes a (substantial) profit. So it is the profits from the bar, and a revenue support contribution from the Parish Council, that covers these losses. In other words quite the opposite of the Parish Council subsidising drinkers in the bar, as some perceive to be the case, the drinkers subsidise Community usage. TCAM came to the December Parish Council meeting and asked for a Council revenue support contribution of £24,000 for next year, with the proviso that if the annual losses are less than £24,000 the full unspent balance will be returned to the Council.

**3.** To help with capital expenditure: as long as the business is not profitable then major capital expenditure is unaffordable. The Parish Council has agreed in principle to cover the costs of major items. At the December Council meeting TCAM indicated that £8-10,000 was likely to be needed next year; this includes £5,500 to replace the carpets.

# 4. To ensure that TCAM operates in accordance with the lease, providing essential facilities for the village.

So the monetary implications of the first three points are substantial. In view of this representatives of the Council attend TCAM Board meetings. The Parish Council is well aware of the strenuous efforts TCAM are making to both increase revenue and reduce costs.

We should remember though that we have a community building that is possibly the best in the County, and the envy of many, many villages. Keeping it so will always be expensive; the Council is building up reserve funds to ensure that any major issue can be addressed quickly - i.e. so we won't have to wait, and maybe close part/all of The Centre in order to raise the necessary funds. If expenditure on maintenance, revenue support and/or capital replacement is less than budgeted the surplus will be added to that fund. Once it has reached a satisfactory level we will be able to reduce the precept.

Not happy? Please tell us; any ideas for ways we can improve any of this are welcome. Of course the option is there for you to do it better; all Councillors are up for reelection in May. You can stand for election then; frankly I wish more people would, as that is the essence of democracy.

### Wind turbine

Yes, the one that has appeared by the C31 access road was a surprise to us all. It sits within Daventry Council's area; and they had not advised us of the application. We are still unsure as to whether Kettering Council had been advised; certainly Kettering and ourselves need to establish a better working relationship with Daventry to head off such things happening in the future.


### **Best Village Competition**

We will enter again this year. We won the Newcomers Cup last year and came third in the large village section. Our aim this time is, of course, to win it. Do you want to help? ### **Taylor Wimpey:**

Chris Leeson, Project Director at Taylor Wimpey, came to our December meeting to update us. Key items were:

- **Roads:** these are completed to adoption standard but cannot be adopted by County Highways until the drains and sewers have been adopted by Anglian Water. Unfortunately this is held up by a dispute with a land-owner. Even if that dispute were to be resolved immediately it would be c. 18 months before road adoption could be completed. This in particular affects the ability of the Police to enforce parking and speeding issues.
- **Open Spaces:** all the major open spaces have now been adopted by Kettering Council; these include the ecomeadow opposite the school; the woodlands; the village green; the playing fields and the pond. The areas remaining are smaller patches within / alongside roads.
- N.B. both the above exclude the David Wilson area, which is being covered by DW themselves. We are unable to get an up-to-date picture on this; the last we heard re open spaces is that DW and Kettering Council are unable to come to an agreement.
- **Pub Site:** Chris apologised for the delay in clearing this properly and promised it would be started by mid-January (in fact work has now started). Once cleared up however ongoing responsibility will lie with the owners of the site, Mawsley Taverns.
- **School crossing:** this project sits with the school, with support from the Parish Council. Progress is proving difficult, however it was encouraging that Chris accepted that TW have a responsibility to ensure roads under their control (i.e. not yet adopted) are safe; and therefore they will help with some interim measures.


### Dear Editor

We understand from the last contact that Sue and Helen are thinking of returning home, at the end of January!





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# Mawsley Coffee Club ....2005 & beyond



In the beginning . . . . Mawsley village was a building site; new homes were being established and Hawthorn Avenue was the furthest extent of the village, with green fields beyond. Mawsley is renowned for its community spirit and,

from the very start, several newcomers had the vision to establish a community in the village. Moving to a new area can be a lonely experience, especially for those who have retired and are at home all day. Just over ten years ago, coincidentally on the same day, Molly and John Shortt and Pat Ellis moved into their homes next door to each other in Hawthorn Avenue. In January 2005, once they had settled in and introduced themselves, Molly and Pat organised a leaflet drop around the village and invited Mawsley residents who had retired to a coffee morning at Pat's home to provide an opportunity to meet and get to know each other.

Seven people attended that first coffee morning and they included Brenda, Carol, Denise, Joan and Margaret. These seven ladies found that as other groups, such as the WI and Gardening Club, became established in the village, they had already formed their own social network of support. Although, in the days before The Centre was built, attending these meetings, especially on dark winter nights required a powerful torch and a certain level of agility in negotiating the unmade and unlit paths and roads.


Since that time Mawsley Coffee Club has provided friendship and support for its membership, which has

grown steadily over ten years, and now includes almost seventy ladies and gentlemen who have retired, or who are approaching retirement. 
Santa, Frosty and MADS x


### Loddington and Mawsley Cricket Club 2015 Season

### Nature on your doorstep

### A stroll round Mawsley and district with Les, Woody and Paul on 7th January 2015

### Paul

As the day dawned frosty pink the full moon set behind a thin layer of cloud. A small group of starlings were silhouetted leaving their roost on the way to their feeding grounds. The evening before I had watched dozens of small flocks of gulls flying south west over Mawsley. They were no doubt on route from feeding in fields and on local reservoirs to join the massive winter gull roost at Pitsford Reservoir. Numbers of gulls often reach 20,000 or so on winter evenings and can usually be clearly seen from the causeway. In the morning I didn't spot any gulls flying north east as I had on other occasions, maybe I'd got up too late! However, returning home from our stroll I spotted a Buzzard being harried by a lone Lesser Black Backed Gull above Hawthorn Avenue.

Les and I met at the pond. As we stood there gazing into the lifeless murky depths we both agreed it was not a very inviting place to live. However, even though we couldn't make out any living things, they certainly were around. Nymphs of dragonflies, mayflies and stone flies are active, feeding and growing in the water often under ice to emerge in spring and early summer as adults. So what of our frogs, toads and newts? Male frogs often bury themselves in the mud at the bottom of the pond



whereas female frogs and toads choose a cosy ditch or hedgerow. Newts overwinter on land returning to the pond for breeding in early spring to mid

summer. They then live on land in damp places usually under rocks, logs or debris.

Taking the tarmac path down Loddington Way whilst discussing how healthy the hedge looked we heard the unmistakable sound of tits foraging. A small group of 4 Coal Tits and one Great Tit came into view, an unusual sighting as they are often solitary birds. Further down looking left onto the grassed area two Pied Wagtails were feeding frantically. These sprightly black and white birds are resident in Mawsley but can be joined by birds from further north on passage from Scotland in autumn and winter.

Les reported sighting a Barn Owl flying along a ditch at the side of the Old to Mawsley lane last week. It landed on the hedge and looked at him for a while. There have been several other recent reports in the area possibly due to 2014 being an exceptional breeding year for Barn Owls. These wonderful animals can be observed hunting in daylight during colder snaps of weather when food is in short supply. I have been told Barn Owls were a common sight quartering the fields at dusk hunting for field voles where Mawsley now stands; in fact I recall we used to hear them screeching at night when we first moved here 10 years ago. At the time of our walk, the

ground underfoot was quite wet after the recent prolonged wet weather. This, combined with relatively mild weather over the last few months, made me notice that the grassy areas and lawns of Mawsley look healthily green. Enough to tempt me at least to give my own lawn a light trim, with the blades set high, to make it look presentable through to the spring. Obviously, do not do this in frosty or very wet conditions. And on no account set the blades too low. This will just encourage moss and all the attendant eradication problems, most of which involve backache!

How often do we say how one season's plant growth is so different from the year before? No more so than this year, I couldn't help reflecting, and you would be quite right in thinking that it's inconsistent weather that's responsible. This year, for example, no snow, and not many frosts (so far!), which means that the cold loving, highly scented shrubs such as mahonia, winter jasmine and the pink flowering viburnum bodnantense have not done well. At the same time, we notice how the leaf spears of spring flowering bulbs like daffodils, are vigorously pushing up and the first snow drops are already abundant, taking advantage of this year's more temperate conditions.

Normally, in mid-winter, the fields around Mawsley planted with oil seed rape, flock with wood pigeons, which find the green leaves of the plant tasty and easy to get to. The damage they do can be quite serious for the poor farmer, which is why we see the scarecrows in the fields and possibly gas guns detonating at, some might say, annoying intervals from dawn to dusk. However, these same birds, in smaller groups, are sometimes seen, flapping and precariously balancing on the ivy vines growing up trees and walls. They are after one of the last edible fruits of the year - the ivy berry growing in black clusters throughout the bush. Ivy is also perfect as warm roosting territory for birds, and is also a late source of pollen for countless insects, including moths.

# Mawsley Open Gardens 2015

With the support of Gardening for All an Open Gardens event will return to Mawsley this year on the weekend of 21st/22nd June. (Which day—or both still to be decided.)

We are in discussion with The Centre to combine the gardens with an event there as well so that visitors and residents will have more than one reason to be out and about in Mawsley over that weekend.

It might seem rather early to be announcing this but my purpose is to ask you to think now about whether you could join in by opening your garden that weekend. It does not have to be grand or designer—we promote the event as a collection of small, new gardens opened to share ideas of what can be done in a small area on clay and in wind and we remind visitors that some are still work in progress.

What is the point of opening? For me there are two reasons: firstly I love my garden and like to share it with others and secondly it makes me get all the necessary work done early in the season so that from late June onwards I can just sit back and enjoy it. Without that deadline I would still be getting round to it in September!

### Mawsley, The Nearly Village – Not A Social History, Part V. By Professor Ed Case, FRS

### Tara M'Duc.

Having declared himself King of France at the start of the Hundred Years War, Edward III turned to some of his most loyal Dukes to raise forces to fight the French on their



home soil and, by 1338, a mighty force was assembled to invade Northern France. However, due to a blockade of the port of Calais by French fishermen<sup>1</sup> the invasion was thwarted. The King then turned to his less loyal supporters and asked the Duc de Grangepuit if he wouldn't mind nipping over to Normandy, with as many locals as he cared to take with him, and just check how things were in that part of the country. Knowing the residents of Malasleau were more keen to partake of alcohol than anyone else in the country, the Duc

merely had to mention the possibility of a glass of Normandy cider and very quickly a force of some 50 local men was assembled. In carts provided by the Knights of Old, the force left in early 1339 with cries of "it will be all over by Mid-Winter's day!" and plaintive cries from the women folk of "tara me duck" (a local bastardisation of the greeting usually given to the Duc de Grangepuit of a fanfare of trumpets whenever he entered a room).

The journey to Normandy was, by all accounts, uneventful - the carts provided by the Knights of Old proved sturdy and the boats procured on the south coast of England ferried carts and travellers safely to northern Normandy<sup>2</sup>. What greeted the Duc and his men was, however, shocking - in the years of absence of the Grangepuits the French peasantry had been revolting but, one may argue, had they ever been anything else? The Duc's property had

fallen into disrepair and the Chateau de Grangepuit was now a home for cattle and a public urinal<sup>3</sup>. As they moved further inland there were similar scenes at other once mighty properties held by other Duc's of Normandy. In a moment of despair the Duc renounced his title in a hastily composed letter to the French King

(not Edward III) advising him of the same. He also determined to change his name. Taking aside a few of his loyal troops from Malasleau the conversation is reputed to have been as follows:

Duc (pointing at a building): "En Francais, ca c'est "un Grange". Et, en Anglais?" Malasleauvian: "Well me old Duc, I b'aint got a clue

what you are talking about, but why are you pointing at that there barn?"

Duc (pointing at a hole in the ground): "Et ca, c'est "un puit".

Malasleauvian: "And now he be pointin' at that well over there."

Duc: "Bien, a ce moment le nom de mon famille est "Barnwell", est, avec le nom de le reigne, je suis "Edward Barnwell".

And with that, he was off, followed by 50 very confused Malasleuvians desperate to find some Normandy cider "a vendre" so they could fill their carts and return home.

### Ol de Groosvey

In turning his back on all things French, the residents of Malasleau were soon to find that Edward Barnwell had found much enlightenment during a short excursion to Flanders during a less than direct journey home. He became particularly enamoured of the work of a windmill builder called OI de Groosvey and determined to build a series of windmills between Malasleau and Broughton which could be used by the locals for the grinding of, well, whatever needed grinding – wheat had yet to be invented. However a windmill<sup>4</sup> was built in the late 1340's by the hamlet of Middletown (now Middleton) half way between Malasleau and Broughton. It was unexpected and not part of Edwards plans, Malasleuvians and residents of other locales were "not happy", but what could be done?
