Mawsley has won two awards at the Northamptonshire Best Village Competition at its first attempt.

The judges said that they had been very impressed by the community spirit, the number of clubs and activities, the village website, The Centre and the relationship with the school and they declared us winner of the Newcomers' Cup, which is a very beautiful silver rose bowl that we will hold for a year.

That was not all. Mawsley also came third, Highly Commended, in the large villages category. The winner of that section was Stanwick who won the Newcomers' Cup last year— setting a very clear precedent and challenge for us! Weedon Bec came second in the large villages category.

We all know that Mawsley is a great village but persuading three judges who have only our paper entry form and a two hour visit to base their decision on is not easy—where do you start? We have Bob Littler to thank for suggesting that we enter in the first place and then carrying out all the research necessary to complete the incredibly detailed and searching entry form.

So what next? We can't stop now. Hopefully Mawsley will now set itself the target of becoming the county's Best Large Village in 2015, and even the Best Village overall.

We also offer our congratulations to our next door neighbours, Great Cransley, who have entered the competition before but this time were also successful, coming third in the small villages category.



Mawsley Parish Council Annual Report

It has been a rather turbulent year for the Parish Council; more Councillors have resigned than we would like to have seen, though it does mean welcome to some new ones.

Anyway I hope things will settle down now, so we can get on with some of the issues and opportunities facing the village. It was also unfortunate that due to illness Richard Barnwell did not feel able to stand for the Chair again this year; so you've now got me instead. Hopefully Richard will soon be fully sorted, and he has remained as a Councillor.

About three years ago we took the conscious decision to try to adopt a more visible profile in the village; you will have seen the articles in most News & Views. However we do think there is more we can do. Therefore we have now put last year's financial results on the website; and each month we will post a spreadsheet showing income and expenditure vs. budget. Go to www.mawsleyvillage.co.uk and click on the Parish Council thumbnail.

Over the past year we have continued to work closely with the management team of The Centre. I and others have explained in the past what an expensive building The Centre is to run, meaning that the Parish Council has to subsidise it in order to keep down charges for community activities and groups who use it (Scouts; Line Dancing; dance school; Under 5s etc.). Frankly we don't see that subsidy reducing greatly in the foreseeable future and on top of that capital expenditure is rising as equipment bought when it opened has to be replaced. Add to that increasing maintenance costs and it all adds up to, I regret, a substantial precept on your Council Tax, and quite a headache.

Nonetheless progress continues to be made and it remains a top-class facility that other villages would love to have. We have just signed a new lease with the MVA; and formalised agreements re Parish Council funding support.

Throughout the last year we have continued to press the Borough Council, County Council and Taylor Wimpey to get

the village finally properly completed. All the roads have now been brought up to adoption standard and are progressively being taken over by County Highways. Similarly re the sewers and Anglian water.

Progress too at last in getting adoption of open spaces by the Borough. Ten key areas, including the green and land opposite the school have now been taken over by them; the balance of larger areas is to follow. This means that the cost of maintaining them falls to the Borough, not to the Parish, and also it gives us more opportunity to make more use of these areas. This may mean some smaller areas remaining that we do have to take responsibility for; not clear yet. However a condition of the Borough taking ownership of

the pond (as opposed to Highways, who would then have filled it in) is that the village takes responsibility for maintaining it.

Other more weighty issues on the horizon revolve around the Borough Council's plans for housing. We have had some discussions with them, principally around making clear that Mawsley needs to settle in before yet more new houses are built. However although it is inevitable we will have to take some at some point we are hopeful (nothing is ever fixed in these matters) that the Borough accept that Mawsley should only see a small number (50 - 70). This is stated in the Borough's draft housing plans.

It is difficult for us to materially affect this decision, however if we have a Neighbourhood Plan we will have some influence. This is not quite as easy as it may sound; a Neighbourhood Plan is a statutory document that has to be prepared is a set way, with extensive consultation both within the village and with external agencies (Highways, Environment etc., etc.). It also has to be consistent with the essence of the Borough's housing plans.

As ever a wide range of topics continue: road crossings for schoolchildren; what to do with the pub site; plastic windows; dog fouling; bus shelters; litter bins; how we look after the village - to name just a few.

Exhibition



Word on the Street

We assumed in the last edition of News & Views, that we did not have a direct connection with military per-

sonnel in the 1914/18 war, but we have now discovered that our close neighbouring village Cransley has, and thanks to the kind permission of *Peter Greenall* and his extensive research, we are able to pay a poignant tribute to:

Corporal Leonard Carrington.


Leonard was born in 1897, the youngest son of John and Martha Carrington's family of 9 children, who lived at Cransley Lodge Cransley. As a farm labourer, he worked the surrounding fields of Cransley, which was part of Mawsley at that time.


He was recruited to the $2^{ND}/6^{TH}$ Battalion of the North Staffordshire Regiment and died of wounds on the 21^{ST} March 1918 age 21.

The War Memorial at Church Lane, Cransley, lists his name, together with 16 other villagers of Cransley, making a combined total with Broughton, of 45 men who died.



This was a dreadful and devastating loss to the families of the comparatively small population within the villages, at that time. His regiment lost 5,430 men during the war and Leonard is buried at Boulogne Eastern Cemetery.

From our close neighbouring village of Cransley, we move to the close neighbouring county of Leicestershire and with the kind approval of **Judy** Baker who lives in Mawsley, we can share her detailed family records and pay tribute to her grandfather.

Joseph and wife Sarah with son, France Grenier.

Corporal Joseph Cook

Joseph was born in Twyford the son of William and Mary Cook and lived in Burbage with his wife Sarah and son, France Grenier, who was named after the place called Grenier, in France.

On the outbreak of war he was called up as a reservist and went out to France in September 1914. In May 1915 he was invalided home wounded.

He had served eight years in India with the 2ND Leicesters and in January 1916 he was transferred to the Northamptonshire Regiment and was sent to Egypt.

Joseph was killed in action on Friday the 2ND of November 1917, five days before

the end of Third Battle of Gaza at the age of 31. Had he lived until the following Sunday, he would have been a time-expired man, having served 13 years with the Colours, and released.

He is buried at Gaza Military Cemetery, Palestine and his name is recorded on Burbage War Memorial.



MAWSLEY COMMUNITY PRIMARY SCHOOL

History Club.

Report by Kallie Bauckham, Class 11

his term in History Club we are looking at World War One. So far, we have started making our own timelines, highlighting the key events between 1910 and 1920. As well as the most important event (World War One) we also put down things like when the first scouting group was formed in the UK and the sinking of the Titanic on the 14th of April 1912 at 11:40.p.m. To have a slight bit of competition the girls' made a separate timeline to the boys.

In the second week, we started making our own trenches out of strong pieces of cardboard, some multi-coloured art straws, a few lolly sticks, some double sided sticky tape and a lot of patience for getting the duckboards to stick! (Blue Peter would be proud!) One of the main problems was time; it just seemed to go so quickly! Some of us made some dugouts, some of us made an elbow rest and some of us even made sand bags out of scraps of fabric. Despite getting squashed by a rucksack, they looked great!

We went on to learn about nursing during the Great War. We looked at Florence Nightingale but focused more on Edith Cavell. We learned about her story:

She moved to Brussels just before the war.

She taught other nurses how to do their jobs correctly- she was very strict!

Edith was told to start nursing soldiers when the war begins.

The hospital she worked at was a Red Cross hospital, meaning when the Germans took over the land she had to help them, as well as helping the British.

When the soldiers got better she kept them and helped them escapeshe helped over 100 soldiers before being shot on October the 12th 1915.

Finally we will be looking at the Suffragette Movement for women's rights. We hope to look at the suffragette who was killed under the King's horse at a horse race but we will be focusing more on Universal Suffrage.

We were lucky enough to be joined by the current Year 4 students for our World War I Exhibition which took place on Friday, 11th - Sunday, 13th July at St Andrew's Church, Cransley.

The students took part in a discussion, led by Mr P Greenhall, as to his work tracing the names on the war memorial, one of whom we now know to have farmed the land that is now Mawsley. He traced the men through their early lives within Cransley (and Mawsley) using primary sources of evidence.

I would like to congratulate these children on their behaviour - you are a credit to your families and your school. Not only did you remain interested at all times but you found information in the Parish Records that we had missed ourselves!! Well done.

Nature on your doorstep

A stroll round Mawsley and district with Les and Paul on 17th July 2014

From Les ...

Oh dear. Once again, with the onset of really hot weather, we have carnage of the hanging baskets. Commonly around the village we have seen wilting, dying or dead plants in baskets, simply because of lack of water. It should be remembered that in these hot conditions watering twice a day may well be necessary. Even if there has been a shower of rain, do not assume that it has been enough to soak the compost. Having said that there is nothing quite like Miracle Gro to liven up ailing plants. Miracle Gro is a plant food, and in my experience it does exactly what it says on the bottle. Most garden centres sell it. With my wife, I plant and maintain the flower planters/tubs outside the Centre and it is this product that keeps them looking good.

Beyond the Village, Paul and I took a ramble, the route of which he will describe later. On the wild plant side of things Paul pointed out the tall pink flowered spikey plants that are very noticeable now as you come out of entrance two and go towards Harrington. This is Rosebay Willow Herb, also known as "Bomb Weed", derived from the fact that desolate bombed out areas from the wars were quickly colonised by this one plant.

Also noticeable were the large plate sized seed heads of wild angelica – not to be confused with cow parsley whic we mentioned as an early spring grower but now

wild angelica – not to be confused with cow parsley which we mentioned as an early spring grower but now completely dead and invisible. A tall, bold white flowering plant was also there on the roadside - Meadowsweet. Evidently this plant can be useful in helping soothe stomach disorders and improving ones complexion. All at the same time, one wonders!

From Paul

The hottest afternoon of the year so far saw Les, Woody the Jack Russell and myself embarking on a walk along the bridleway that starts almost opposite the second exit from Mawsley. As soon as we turned left into the field the distinctive 'a little bit of bread and no cheeeese' call of the yellow hammer urged us on. The singer was seen perched on the top of the hedge to our left with its unmistakable bright yellow head and brown under parts. Once a common sight in Northamptonshire but less so nowadays.

The bridleway takes you along the edge of the first field then directly across a field of wheat till the path reaches a hedged fence line. As we turned right we negotiated a large muddy patch, Les and I carefully edged round it but Woody



ploughed straight through it leaving his doggy foot prints. Luckily we were able to clearly see several footprints of birds and mammals. The most easily seen and identified were the large three toed bird print, probably pheasant and the small rounded 5 toed print of either the stoat or weasel.

On reaching the Old to Mawsley lane

we turned right immediately noticing signs of rabbit and badger digging under the hedge on our right. It was along this lane that a grass snake was spotted sun bathing in the middle of the road a few days before. The grass snake is the larger of our three native snakes and easily identified by its light green or yellow collar. Its habitat is near to ponds, rivers, ditches and marshland where amphibians form the main part of its diet.

As we approached Kites Hall Farm wood warblers called from the hedge rows, wood pigeons cooed from the adjacent woodland and swallows lazily flitted by in the stifling heat. We noted that for over a hundred years Kites Hall Farm may not have seen any red kites hunting in its skies but since re-introduction they are a daily sight.

We re-entered the village by the second entrance commenting on the trees either side of the road. Beautiful examples of locally common Ash and Oak.



Mawsley, The Nearly Village – *Not* A Social History, Part III. By Professor Ed Case

History on our doorstep

with apologies to historians

Norman Wisdom

Although the Norman Conquest took place in 1066 it was not until 1086 that the people of Moosloo found out that they were now ruled by a Frenchman called William who had won the right to the throne by landing at Hastings with a few hundred men and beating the living daylights out of a much larger Saxon Army who were tired having just played Chelsea at Stamford Bridge. In 1086 William had sent out surveyors to take account of who held what land and how much livestock was on that land, establish the value of that land and livestock and then ask His Majesty's Revenue and Customs to send out a tax bill. This was documented in what became the Domesday Book, and it was an error in the entry for Moosloo that led to great, if short lived, prosperity.

The monks who compiled the Domesday Book for William used Latin however the numerous surveyors reports were written in a mixture of languages and, quite often, were only partially legible. The surveyor who visited Moosloo wrote only in the developing French language – his entry was short and to the point –

"Ca merde ville" (Fig 1).

The regional surveyor, who like most Normans was originally Danish, misread the entry as "Somer ville" (Somer being ancient Danish for Summer) and immediately reported that an inland holiday destination had been discovered and recommended it to the noblemen of William's court. William directed one of his most senior Knights - the Duc

de Grangepuits (Fig 2) – to establish a town at "Somerville" which would provide a summer retreat for his court and courtiers.

The Duc de Grangepuits set about his task with relish such that by the summer of 1088 the hamlet of Moosloo had a magnificent stone built Norman Keep in the style later used for the White Tower in London (Fig 3) and the population had risen to close to two hundred with an influx of building workers. After a renaming ceremony, the town of Somerville was ready for its first "guests" —

one of whom was the original surveyor. The translation error was uncovered, the bottom fell out of the holiday market and the Duc de Grangepuits was left with the original "white elephant", two hundred plus mouths to feed and a large tax bill from a seriously miffed William. The long term, and devout Saxon, residents found this all rather amusing and several changed their surname to Somerville in an attempt to upset the Norman newcomers. Somerville remained a popular surname over the centuries and it was only in 2008 that the last person bearing that name left the village, the irony of this was that the Somerville in question moved to France.

Years ahead of his time, the Duc de Grangepuits established a farming commune and allocated individual plots of land around his Keep to those who remained after the collapse of the holiday industry. Each year he took one tenth (a tithe) of the income earned by each plot owner to help repay his tax bill imposed by William. However, he found the expenses of maintaining a large fortified structure (the upkeep) well-nigh impossible and so, stone by stone the Keep was dismantled and a smaller property built in the nearby village of Cransley where the Grangepuits have lived to this day.

Feudal Dues and the Dark Ages






Fig 4 The Dark Ages in Somerville

Gradually the 200 plus residents of Somerville began to learn how poor the soil in the surrounding area was, farming was hard and the constant battle with Dandelions wore the residents down. By the early 1100's the population was down to less than 30 and the burden of taxation had risen to such an extent that those remaining were paying 110% of their income to the Grangepuits. In another gesture of defiance, those who remained handed their land back to the Duc who proceeded to demonstrate that by careful land management and large fields you could successfully grow cash crops – he no longer needed the Feudal Dues. In a minor act of retribution he did ensure that fires had to be extinguished at sunset each day – the Dark Ages had arrived early in Somerville (Fig 4).

Mawsley enters the 21st Century:

Thanks to Bob Holland for this update on BT Infinity

It was a long wait, but it'll be worth it – BT have finally made their BT Infinity Service available to some of us Mawsleyites.

This means that we can wave a not so fond farewell to the basic broadband service that provided us with the constant buffering message when we tried to stream anything of any significance.

To make this happen, BT have effectively brought the Broughton exchange closer to us connected by a very fast fibre optic cable. You will probably have noticed the shiny new larger connection box close to the old one near the duck pond.

BT call this type of connection FTTC (Fibre to the Cabinet). The existing line from your house is then connected to this new cabinet to complete the connection and "voila" you will now have a much higher speed service. This new connection will not affect your telephone service. There are two options on offer — BT Infinity 1 up to 40Mb download speeds or BT Infinity 2 up to 80Mb download speeds (about £3.00 per month

extra for option 2). The exact speed will depend on how far your house is from the cabinet, but BT will give you an estimate on application.

To sign up or find out more go to www.bt.com/ btinfinity. There are sections covering the speed and optional tv packages, together with a link to check availability by either postcode or telephone number.

Many people have asked why only part of the village is covered? - Again this is all down to the distance from the cabinet as the signal degrades as the line length increases. BT have said that they plan to install another fibre connection box close to the medical centre to provide the service to that part of the village. They haven't committed to a time scale, but, with the instant uptake I hear so far, I don't think it will be a hard business decision for them to get it done PDQ – Watch this Space!
