Scarecrows

Please make a scarecrow for your front garden this weekend for our jubilee celebration,

then show it off again at the Mawsley Fete on 14th July. (For the fete bring your scarecrow to the playing field and we'll set them up all round the edge.)

There are lots of websites showing you how to make a scarecrow - just search 'make a scarecrow'.

Decide how you are going to make it stand up before you begin! The best method is to start with a 2 metre tree stake or strong cane which you bash into the

ground. Then attach cross bars for the arms and waist and hang the clothes on them. It will then stand up on its own even if you don't stuff it, although some stuffing of newspaper, bubble wrap or old clothes will improve the look. Don't bother about hands and feet - just have some straw sticking out. Stuff the end of an old stocking to make a head and tie it over the top of the stake. Stick on a hat and some straw hair and you're done!

Our themes are Royalty and Olympics so this should give you some idea for characters and outfits.

Inside the centre of The Centre

The sound system in the bar / lounge has gone wazzy. The bad news is that, as it is a commercial system, repairs won't come cheap. Mind you it has been running for around 12 hours a day for 5½ years – that's about 24,000 hours.

The real significance of this is that this is only one of a range of equipment that was bought when The Centre opened; there is a whole suite of kit in the bar / cellar. All this has been running for all that time, so the prospect of hefty repair and replacement bills sometime soon looms.

I talked in the last edition about the issues we face in trying to run The Centre as close to profitability as possible; capital expenditure merely adds to the problem.

We have opened a dialogue with the Parish Council re funding over the next few years and have said we need to consider capital replacement within this.

I just want to make clear that if the glasswasher packs up I'm not putting Marigolds on.


- talking to Borough and County Councils,

Parish Council Annual Meeting Held on 14th May Report by the Editor

This part of the meeting was attended by 11 residents and 3 Parish Councillors and heard reports from just two village groups, the Bowls Club and MADs.

The Annual Meeting was followed by the normal monthly Parish Council meeting. This was attended by 17 members of the public and five Parish Councillors. Residents were invited to raise any issues of concern.

The first was concern about street parking throughout the village, but particularly on Main Street and Broughton Road by the pond. A majority of those present considered much of the parking to be irresponsible, inconsiderate and, in some cases, dangerous. Residents wanted to know what the Parish Council was doing about it. Councillors were divided as to whether it was a problem or not, but in any case advised that it was a matter for the County Council and the Police, whose powers were restricted by the fact that the roads had not yet been adopted by Northants CC Highways Dept.

Other issues raised by residents at this meeting were: the lack of maintenance of the verges and hedgerows and the land known as the Eco meadow. See pages 6 - 8 for further coverage of these topics.

Face to face with Peter Thomas

Last week, at the Parish Council Annual General Meeting, Peter Thomas was re-elected as Chair for a further year. This seemed a good time to ask him a few questions about what the Parish Council has been doing. Les Cottington had already contacted News & Views to say that there were a few issues he would like to put to Peter Thomas so we (that's Les and me, the Editor) decide to quiz him together.

Upkeep of the verges has been very poor this year. Consequently the village looks a mess. Why aren't they being dealt with?

Verges aren't the responsibility of the Parish Council. Most of them still belong to the builders and I am sorry to say that those belonging to Taylor Wimpey were left for far too long this year. You have probably noticed that the David Wilson Homes land is being well maintained. The areas at the two entrances to the

village have already been transferred to local authority ownership I think, and they are regularly mown.

There were weeds and grass up to two feet high on some of the verges until last week. Surely there was something you could have done sooner to make sure that Taylor Wimpey got the job done.

The Parish Council has made representations to them but we have no leverage. They have a maintenance programme/contract in place, but they've finished building and selling their houses here so I guess they no longer have the same incentive to keep the village looking smart. The weather can't have helped – last year's dry conditions meant growth was slower, maintenance requirements less. This year.... well! Look at it! I suggest that residents direct any concerns to Chris Leeson, Regional Engineering Manager at Taylor Wimpey, on 0116 281 6000.

Will we have this problem every year from now on?

No. In due course Kettering Borough Council (KBC) or Northants County Council will adopt the open spaces and verges and it will be their responsibility to maintain them. They are geared up to carry out this sort of maintenance work and we expect they'll operate to an acceptable timetable. KBC already look after the playing field quite well for example.

Why don't they own them already? The village was started 11 years ago, so this is taking a very long time.

Local authorities won't take on ownership of the land until it has been brought up to the required standard. Work is being done at the moment to reach that standard and to deal with legalities, because obviously the developers don't want to be hanging onto it for a moment longer than necessary.



So you are going to give us the same answer for the state of the roads, aren't you?

Afraid so! The roads and verges will become the responsibility of the Highways Department at the County Council once they have been approved for adoption. I recently walked the roads on an inspection with representatives from Taylor Wimpey and the County Council & other Parish Councillors. We saw how particular Highways engineers are about the standard that has to be reached. I think while Loddington Way is still in an awful state, the roads that have been finished, such as Main

Street, look quite good. I'm not happy with the slow pace of getting the work done but I do know that the County Council is keeping the pressure on the developers over this, while also recognising the commercial pressures that they are under. Remember, Mawsley was started 11 years ago, but bits of it are yet to be completed. Putting the final surface on roads used by construction traffic would never have been a good idea. So it was always going to take some time, but I doubt any of us thought it would take quite so long.

'Wait for adoption' seems to be the answer to everything. Will that also get the 'Eco Meadow' opposite the school sorted out?

This has been a sorry saga and the state of that field now, full of perennial weeds (mainly Sow Thistle) is in my opinion, entirely down to delay by TW and KBC. It is one of the village open spaces, which KBC will take over from the developers in due course. Four years ago it was relatively devoid of weeds and if the annual work which was recommended by a Turftrax survey had been carried out at the time it could now have been a pretty decent wild flower meadow. But it was left for the unwanted weeds to set seed and it will now take several more years, provided that a proper programme of work is implemented, to get it to an acceptable state. There are a few areas there that local residents have been mowing themselves for many years now and the condition of those is really good. Just shows what can be done with the proper action, and we're doing what we can to make sure the right course of action is taken, before it's adopted by KBC.

Who decided that it would be an 'eco meadow'?

My understanding is that the KBC planners made that decision. The field has poor soil, with subsoil from building work then dumped on it, ideal conditions for wild flowers.

A group of residents has been hoping to create a pocket park there, which might include a wild flower area but would also have some woodland. Will that be possible?

I'm sure that if a volunteer group offered to maintain that land as a Pocket Park, then KBC would be happy to let them do so. But the time for considering detailed proposals for that will be when we have a better idea of when it is going to be ready for hand-over. Plus we need to be sure it's what enough of the village want when the time comes. We will need to ask them.

We must be careful that the village doesn't finish up with the costs and responsibility of maintaining land beyond its means. As I said before, KBC has the equipment and personnel for that. We don't.

Is anything happening to sort out the 'Berlin Wall' on the cycle path?

I take it you mean the fence that blocks off the cycle path just beyond Birch Spinney. Well, there is good news on that front. We've just been informed by KBC that Taylor Wimpey are going to remove it. We will need to discuss/ensure that they then link up the woodland path with the cycle path. The break in the cycle path at that point is a great disappointment to us all. On the original village plans it was shown as continuing behind the houses in Birch Spinney, but planning permission was later granted for two house plots which then blocked the route, despite objection at the time from Mawsley Parish Council. It's easy to see these things get 'missed' in the adoption process, which would be a real shame for residents, so we're making sure such areas are on the agenda of those working on the adoption process.



Does the Parish Council have a collective view on the prospects for the Pub Site now that it is on the market? There have been comments that people are naïve if they think there will ever be a pub there.

There is one school of thought that the site will never attract a pub operator. But I regard the defeat last year of Taylor Wimpey's attempt to put houses on the site as one of our greatest successes. We saved the site so that the village **could** have a pub. I think it's significant that in his decision the Inspector ignored all the practical considerations about the suitability or otherwise of the site for houses, latching on to just one issue, which was that it should be preserved for a community facility. Personally I don't believe there will be a pub there any time soon but I'm confident that the land is safe for community use.

It doesn't look much like a community facility at the moment!

No. It's a disgrace. A real eyesore. The Parish Council did object to Taylor Wimpey when they moved their compound to this prominent site. We felt there were plenty of other, less conspicuous areas of land they could have used while they finished the roads.

Some of your answers today have come as a surprise but I think you assumed we already knew them. Do you recognise that there is a communication problem between the Parish Council and residents?

If there is it's not deliberate. But it's also a comment we've heard before, so we can't ignore it. Our meetings are open $cont'd \mathbf{7}$

to the public and, although there are strict rules about public participation in Parish Council meetings, I interpret those in a very relaxed way, because I welcome public involvement. We've had good public attendance at the last two meetings and that is how I like it. For people who don't or can't attend I try to report the main issues in this newsletter – but it's a difficult balance between writing too much and leaving stuff out.

Personally I've really enjoyed the format of this discussion. I'd like to be able to have discussions like this with more residents. Perhaps there's scope for a regular Councillors' Surgery in the bar from time to time. Just a thought...

There is a perception across the country that most Parish Councillors are approaching or beyond retirement age. Mawsley is quite different from that with younger Councillors but I suspect you are the youngest. Do you have political aspirations?

I suppose, at 42, I could be considered quite young to be Chair of a Parish Council, but I think I've left it too late to start a political career. I came to Mawsley three years ago and joined the Parish Council because I wanted to get involved in the village, not in politics. I wanted to step up and do something to help make Mawsley a good place for my family. I don't believe in sitting back and watching others do it. And now that you've asked the question - I think I'm at exactly the right level of local politics to be able to make a difference where I want to make it.

Thank you to Peter for giving his time for this discussion and thank you to Les Cottington for making the suggestion. Do you have questions you want to put to anyone about the running of the village? Let the editor know and we'll see what we can do.

MAWSLEY BIRD WATCHING - 3

We've had the mildest Winter on record here in the East Midlands/ West Anglia - some deciduous trees and shrubs have kept their leaves since last year, which is really surprising. Birds have been able to shelter in the foliage throughout the period November - February in some gardens so that there have been many more of them than usual. I expect that lots more small birds have survived in Britain this Winter than ever before. As a result they've been emptying the birdfeeders more quickly - but strangely, because the weather has been milder, the starlings, blackbirds and thrushes didn't strip the red and orange berries from the firethorn (pyracantha), until much later. Clearly there has been food available in the fields and hedges too. Did you noticed that some of the tits were encouraged by the milder weather to start looking in boxes for nesting sites in early March!

There has been a lot of Ring Dove activity in gardens throughout Mawsley they are the birds similar to Pigeons but less heavy, often beige or pale blue or pale grey plumage, nearly always in pairs with a very distinctive dark ring around their necks, also called Collar Doves. They land and perch on any solid surface ground, bench, fence, roof, and eat on the ground or from any open container bread/crumbs/seeds/toast etc. Not normally from bird feeders. Like all members of the Pigeon family they are extremely greedy so don't let them hoover up all of the ground food you may have put out for sparrows and other small birds. Shoo them away - they will come back ! It is quite astonishing when you look at the bulk of Pigeons to realise that in level flight they can reach the same speeds as Falcons and Sparrow Hawks - 75 mph plus !

Remember to keep your bird bath clean as birds wash in it and leave feathers and worse behind them so that rapidly it becomes sour. All birds need to drink little and often. Rain water is not self cleaning

Our Mawsley Buzzards over the Loddington Lane area are now being sighted quite often; they really are handsome birds, quite like Eagles and they are very efficient in removing the unsightly victims of 'roadkill'; keep an eye out for them - in the air, picking up or on the road itself.

Now is a good time to re-site your birdfeeders if you want a better view of the birds themselves whilst feeding; early evening is the best time to move them when the birds have gone off to roost. Try to site them where you have a clear view but the birds do not have a view of your whole face.

Taylor Wimpey reports no let-up on village works

Taylor Wimpey is pressing on with its efforts to ensure Mawsley's public facilities and infrastructure are concluded as soon as possible.

Sewage & Drainage

The developer is pleased to report the underground foul infrastructure system has been transferred to Anglian Water, which is now responsible for its ongoing maintenance. On top of this success, negotiations are progressing well for the foul water pumping station to be handed over to Anglian Water, while talks are due to be held in the near future over the adoption of the storm water lagoon located to the north of the estate. Chris Leeson, Taylor Wimpey Project Manager, says: "It is essential the drainage system is fully checked and made good for adoption prior to the final topping of roads. This will prevent the need to dig up newly-finished roads in the future."

Roads

Progress is being made towards finishing off the village's roads, in preparation for adoption by Northamptonshire County Council. Taylor Wimpey has invited tenders for the contract for the remaining works, which include Cransley Rise, School Road and Loddington Way.

Taylor Wimpey has held discussions with parish council members and the County Council's highways department to formulate designs for the final street marking system, in particular for the spine road islands and next to the school.

Pub Site

It is anticipated the pub site will continue to be used as a temporary compound to store materials and equipment for the duration of the works, and this area will be fully cleared and left tidy upon conclusion.

Verges

High rainfall levels during March and April hampered Taylor Wimpey's efforts to mow and weed verges and other public areas, and as a result, landscape contractors have been mobilised to complete the work when weather permits.



Eco Meadow

Maintenance work has taken place on the wildflower meadow, in anticipation of Kettering Borough Council, then subsequently Mawsley Parish Council, taking possession of this land. The handover may be delayed after the recent bad weather, but in the meantime, Taylor Wimpey has commissioned a specialist landscaper to bring the meadow up to the required standard.

Tip of the month

Do you have a lacy hedge?

If so, you are one of many who have a hedge made up of the shrub variety *viburnum tinus*. This is very popular in Mawsley and it is a useful hedging plant because it has attractive spear-



shaped evergreen leaves and clusters of white flowers when the hedge is allowed to grow out.

There is a little beetle whose lava and adult stage attack the plant during the summer, reducing them to a lacework of damaged leaves. There are not many hedges of this type in the village which have escaped these attacks, and there is not a great deal that can be done about it. Most of the damage actually occurs during late spring to early summer when the creamy-yellow black-spotted beetle lava, about 7mm long, are browsing.

A spray exists that can be applied in late spring, but if it was me I would leave it for nature to take its course, as most of the hedges damaged in this way seem to recover partially, if not completely. Les Cottington






