

Bystanders can be lifesavers





Q: If someone was having a heart attack, would you know what to do or where the nearest defibrillator was located?

There are over 30,000 out of hospital cardiac arrests a year in the UK and sadly less than one in ten people survive. A cardiac arrest is caused by an electrical problem in the heart and can be caused by defects to the heart, such as coronary heart disease, a heart attack, or external factors.

Early cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and defibrillating can more than double a person's chances of survival and there is evidence to show response from a bystander can have a significant impact and is a crucial lifesaving skill. The Resuscitation Council states the chance of survival increases two or threefold when bystander CPR is used and provides immediate aid until professional help arrives, helping to maintain oxygen flow to the brain and other vital organs potentially preventing brain damage or death.

Women who go into cardiac arrest in public are less likely to receive CPR from bystanders than men, partly due to failure to diagnose their symptoms because they are female and worrying they will "inappropriately" touch a woman when giving CPR.

For us, as bystanders, to provide this vital first response – we need to be trained, both at recognising cardiac arrest and providing CPR. Nearly half of us in the UK (43%) have never learned CPR and cardiac arrest recognition remains a key priority as it is the first step in triggering the emergency response. Creating a CPR-trained society will save more lives, improve public health, and enhance community resilience during emergencies.

Defibrillation is also key. Did you know we have a defibrillator here in Mawsley? It is located at The Village Centre (TCAM) and its whereabouts and use is instructed by calling the emergency services. It has been used and helped to save lives in our Village.

It is World Restart a Heart Day on October 16th - make this village proud - learn CPR. The British Heart Foundation (BHF) offers a free online training tool that can teach CPR, and the correct steps of defibrillator use in just 15 minutes – use this link to access BHF advice, guidance and free training - https://www.bhf.org.uk/how-you-can-help/how-to-save-a-life. Other organisations providing training include St John's Ambulance and The Red Cross.

This topic is a national campaign for the Women's Institute. Nationally and locally the WI will be working to spread awareness of CPR training courses and the locations of defibrillators in their communities. Mawsley WI will be contributing to this campaign by holding a CPR training session

Why CPR Matters:

Increased Survival Chances:

Especially when performed immediately.

Time-Sensitive:

Every minute without CPR reduces the chances of survival by 10%.

• Empowerment:

CPR skill empowers individuals to act in emergencies and make a difference in someone's life.

Community Benefit:

Create a safer environment for everyone, especially in homes, schools, and workplaces where cardiac arrests can occur.

Hands-Only CPR:

In many situations, hands-only CPR (chest compressions only) is recommended, making it

The Group started April's adventures by taking part in a Hammock Camp at Spotley Woods (just outside Yardley Hastings). Practising their core skills which included:- using knives and saws, fire lighting, preparing meals, cooking on open fires, washing up their own pots and cutlery, singing camp fire songs and putting hammocks up and taking them down (oh and of course - sleeping in them).

In May we held taster sessions for anyone interested in joining our Group. As a result we had a couple of new recruits but are still on the look out for additional adult support - you know where we are, do get in touch.

With the lighter evenings and the warmer weather the Group has been able to hold a lot of the sessions outside. Many evenings have been spent trying out different activities namely: cricket (training was led by Olli and Lou from Kettering Cricket Club); dodge ball (with it being so hot - wet sponges were used instead of balls, which was greatly appreciated by all taking part!); and relay races with buckets of water instead of batons.

Repetition of core skills means that no one forgets the basic skills, so evenings have been spent reiterating knotting techniques - we are all now masters of the reef knot! We also discussed healthy food choices and identified the amount of sugar content in common foods. We even reviewed survival strategies and gave ideas for finding drinking water.

The Group ended the summer activities, just as they had begun, by camping. This took place in tents at John's Lee Wood (in Leicester). Cubs and Scouts enjoyed climbing, abseiling, archery, laser tag, gokarts, demonstrated pioneering skills, and helped to cook outside on fires/using dutch ovens.

From making sundaes (because we can!), to playing unihoc, to learning about fire safety, hiking on the Brampton Valley way, hand and feet painting, completing assault courses, completing the elements for the Athletic badges - these are just some of the activities that we offer our Cubs and Scouts.

Coming up over the next few months the Group are hoping to take over Gravity (in Corby) and have a sleepover there in November. The Group will enjoy trampolining, and will have supper and breakfast there. Hopefully they might also get a small amount of sleep. We are also planning to visit the Black Country Living Museum in Birmingham (we are looking at hiring transport) and we will also try and get return visits for young persons to try kayaking and scuba diving.

Mawsley Girls Football

With the recent European Championship triumph by the England lionesses in late July, it inspires a whole generation of female footballers and promises an exciting future for the sport. But girls' football isn't a new phenomenon in Mawsley, so let's explore what makes the village so special in the realm of girl's grassroots football.



Whilst the village is barely 20 years old, its reputation for

grassroots football supersedes its age, boasting 10 teams, 144 players and 25 coaches, and challenging for the most girls' teams in the county, trumping teams that have been established over a century longer such as Kettering Town. And it's not just about participation at Mawsley Football Club with girls' teams proving successful in the county and beyond with two Junior Premier League sides, and from the club's consistent success in league and cup competitions.

Due to the speed that girl's football has taken off in Mawsley and its relatively short existence, it hasn't yet produced a professional footballer like the boy's setup have. But there are an incredible number of girls playing both for the club currently along with academy set ups such as Northampton Town. Or girls that have left the club to go onto bigger and better things, with players, whose love for the sport, was created at Mawsley ending up at academies such as Cambridge United, Peterborough, MK Dons, Derby County and Watford.

Now with a strong foundation, and an ever-developing girls set up, fuelled by the lionesses and WSL superstars, it is proving to be an exciting time for the Mawsley youth girls' teams.


took part in a number of showcase matches against other clubs. The Thundercats, Hornets & Jaguars all put on a display of fantastic football!

ICONS OF THE GREAT BRITISH SEASIDE RESORT - BEACH HUTS

To the Victorians sea bathing became a must do leisure activity for those who lived near, or could afford to visit, the seaside. This craze spawned the idea of the wheeled bathing machines that were made to preserve the modesty of those wishing to bathe in public. The first bathing machines were used on the beach in Margate, Kent. Royal approval was given to this new fashion when King George III took a medicinal bathe at Weymouth to the musical accompaniment of 'God Save the King'. Queen Victoria installed one at Osborne House on the Isle of Wight in the 1840s.

Early beach huts were former fishermen's huts, boatsheds or converted bathing machines. Felixstowe in Suffolk is believed to have had beach huts from at least 1891. Bournemouth is regarded as the home of purpose municipal-built beach huts where 160 were built, in the style of bungalows, and erected either side of Bournemouth Pier in 1909.

During World War II all UK beaches were closed due to the fears of invasion by the Nazis. The re-opening of beaches in the late 1940s and early 1950s led to a resurgence of the British beaches and the heyday of the beach hut. During this renaissance the 5^{th} Earl of Leicester gifted a beach hut to the Royal Family at Holkham, Norfolk. Our late Queen was known to have loved that hut, which was owned by the Royal Family for 70 years until it was destroyed by fire in 2006.

Another notable hut in Whitstable, Kent, was owned by the artist Tracey Emin who sold it to collector Charles Saatchi for £75,000. This hut experienced the same outcome as the Royal hut, having been destroyed by fire in 2006 when the warehouse where it was stored burned down.

Current estimates suggest there are now over 20,000 beach huts in the UK with some Local Authorities having long waiting lists for huts. Many huts are privately owned, those owners having to pay an annual licence fee to their Local Authority. For example, Tendring District Council currently charge an annual fee of £512.50 for their sites in Clacton on Sea.









The family shown relaxing outside their beach hut have owned it for over 40 years, have basic kitchen facilities. They have, however, no running water but nearby standpipes are provided as part of the local Council's commitment to the coastal environment.

Beach Huts on Mersea Island, Essex

The appeal of the British seaside and that of the iconic beach hut was in danger of being eroded by the rise in package holidays to Mediterranean destinations. The economies of seaside towns and villages was also threatened by this sudden rush to holiday abroad. Many seaside resorts experienced decline, with some only just finding a route to reinvention today. Beach huts proved, however, to be remarkedly resilient and rather than practical necessities became nostalgic luxuries. The 1990s saw the beginning of the modern beach hut boom. Rising property prices and increases in leisure time resulted in the once humble beach hut becoming almost a status symbol with prices rising from huts commanding a few hundred pounds in the 1970s to changing hands for tens of thousands in the 1990s.

Crazy prices? In 2023 five wooden cabins on the same stretch of sand, on Mudeford Spit, Dorset, went on the market, all at the same time with a combined sale total of an amazing £2.1 million – 2 for £450,000 and three for £440,000, £430,00 and £395,000. 
