The Centre at Mawsley would personally like to thank Paul Marlow from the Northamptonshire Search & Rescue Team for kindly donating his time on a Saturday afternoon in January to teach some of the the Centre team how to ventilate a patient with cardiac arrest and use the Village Defibrillator.



Northamptonshire Search and Rescue (NorthantsSAR) are a group of trained volunteers who are on call 24hrs a day, 365 days a year. The team today is extremely well

trained and equipped and regularly assist Northamptonshire police and other statutory emergency services and use their wide and varied experience to also help in communities in areas such as the training we were lucky enough to receive.

NSAR are mainly called out to assist in the search for missing or vulnerable people across the county's 760 square miles (2,364 square km) in the varied terrain of Northamptonshire.

They are made up entirely of volunteers, and rely solely on fundraising and donations to be able to continue this valuable resource.

We hope to do some more work with NSAR to support them this year and we are also thinking of opening up this training to a wider audience later this year, which takes approx. 2 hours - please contact Jane at the Centre if you are interested and we will gauge interest and sort a further date.

MAWSLEY SCHOOL

A half-term is already under our belt at school and we now begin the run up to Easter! It is hard to believe we are nearly 1/4 of the way through 2017 already!

Year 1

The question that drove the children's learning was 'Why can't a meerkat live in the North Pole?' A very exciting end to the children's topic resulted in a visit to the MK Snozone where the children got to experience what it would be like to live in a gigantic freezer, and why a meerkat would not last very long!

Year 2

Have been learning about fables and studying Little Red Riding Hood. The children have enjoyed writing their own versions focussing on developing their innovation and creative skills. They were exploring food from around the world and even managed to create and enjoy their own curry!

Year 3

Also learning about fables from around the world, in particular they have been looking at Native American Indian stories from North America. The children enjoyed practising different creative techniques to produce pictures of The Grand Canyon, exploring depth and dimensions.

Year 4

The children have been living through history this term and experiencing what life would be like in Anglo-Saxon times, exploring art, poetry, clothing and storytelling. We were fortunate to have a visitor from Gripping History who delivered a fantastic day of learning that culminated with a very enthusiastic battle!



Year 5

The older children have been exploring river and mountains for their topic. Looking closely at the altitudes of the highest peaks around the world and how mountains are made. They have also been getting hands on in science and creating their own plastic using milk and white vinegar!

Year 6

Have been debating global issues such as the refugee crisis. The children have been studying the situation in Afghanistan and on our doorstep in Calais. They have used their research and learning to write stories focusing on using speech and dialogue. Using their artistic skills the children have created some magnificent scale maps of Afghanistan – not an easy task!



MAWSLEY PARISH COUNCIL HAVE A VACANCY

If you are interested in representing your local community as Parish Councillor please contact the Clerk.

You can stand if you are a British citizen, or a citizen of the Commonwealth or the European Union, and 18 years or older and:

- You are registered as a local government elector for the parish for which you want to stand; or
- You have, for the whole 12 month period up to the date of the election, occupied (as owner or tenant) land or other premises in the parish; **or**
- Your principal or only place of work during that same 12 months period has been in the parish; or
- You have during the whole of that same 12 month period resided in the parish or within 4.8 kilometres (3 miles) of it.

You cannot be a candidate if:

- You are employed by the parish or town council or hold a paid office under the council (including employment by any joint boards or committees of the council).
- You are the subject of a bankruptcy restriction order or interim order.
- You have, within five years before the day of the election, been convicted in the United Kingdom of any offence and have had a prison sentence (whether suspended or not) for a period of over three months without the option of a fine.
- You have been disqualified under Part III of the Representation of the People Act 1983 (which relates to donations and other offences) or under the Audit Commission Act 1998.

WHAT DOES A PARISH COUNCILLOR DO?

Councillors represent the electors in their parish ward. They are accessible to residents, listen to their concerns and to deal with them or to pass them for action to the appropriate authorities directly or via the Parish Clerk. Councillors may represent the Council on local bodies and in meetings with other authorities. They help formulate responses to county or national consultations when relevant local issues are involved and provide leadership on local initiatives.

The championing of local projects and providing leadership over local issues is an important, and rewarding, aspect of a councillor's role. Persistence in dealing with the authorities and utilities is an essential virtue. In everything they do, councillors need to bring integrity and common sense to their approach and look for viable, pragmatic outcomes that can be achieved.

All this work involves time, of course. Meetings have to be attended. Planning applications and other documents have to be reviewed. The work load varies, but an average weekly estimate of 3 hours would be reasonable. In return is the immense satisfaction of putting something back into the community. Councillors have substantial support in performing their duties. First of all there is the Parish Clerk. This is a paid position, and provides an experienced person to look after the administration of the council as well as to be on hand to offer advice and guidance to the councillors.

Training is available to the new councillor which is of high quality and covers all aspects of the role. The Council acts very much as a team and fellow councillors are always there to support each other. Help is also available from organisations such as NCALC (Northamptonshire County Association of Local Councils).

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MAWSLEY VILLAGE SURGERY

Our opening hours for the surgery are: Monday, Tuesday,Wednesday, Friday 8am to 6pm and we provide a late clinic on a Thursday 8am to 7.30pm. Due to feedback, the late clinic has been extended to include Doctor, Nurse and Health Care appointments.

The dispensary has extended its hours and now opens:

Monday to Friday 9am to 12pm and 1pm to 6pm only closing for 1 hour at lunch time and opening around clinic times for your convenience and this will continue. The Pharmacy is now open in the Village but our services we provide will not change. The dispensary will still be dispensing medication as before.

We are continuing with all the existing services we provide which include Minor Injury, Minor Surgery, Ante-natal and Post-natal care, Contraception advice, Insurance Medicals, HGV and Taxi Medicals, Dispensing of medication, Phlebotomy, Asthma/Diabetes/Heart Disease, vaccinations (travel and routine), Cervical smears, Child Health Surveillance, Weight management and wound care. In addition to this we have been offering National Health checks.

We have also been offering extra on the day appointment over the winter period to help with Same Day demand. We will be offering extra Health Reviews of our elderly population from April.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN QUESTIONNAIRE RESULTS SUMMARY

January 2017

In order to determine how Mawsley Villagers felt about further development within the Mawsley Parish boundary a questionnaire was constructed and hand delivered to all dwellings within the Village in July 2016, with a request to complete by end August 2016. At the same time the questionnaire was posted on the online survey site – <u>surveymonkey.co.uk</u>.

The reason for the questionnaire was to gain feedback from the Village to help determine the viability and need to progress further with producing a Neighbourhood Plan for further development of Mawsley Village.

It was also indicated that the findings would be shared with the Village so that the Parish Council could subsequently decide if proceeding with a Neighbourhood Plan was viable and this will be decided in the coming months.

In total 112 questionnaires were completed, which based on circa 900 dwellings in the village represented around a 12% response.

55% of the respondents were in the age group 26-49, with disappointingly, only 3% below the age of 25. More than 20 questionnaires were anonymous or with vague or partial contact details. However, the answer trends were consistent with other fully filled in questionnaires.

The results show that there appears to be a consistent general trend as to why Mawsley Village has become the home of choice for many, as follows:-

- Safe
- Quiet
- Community Spirit
- Friendly
- Countryside
- Village life
- School
- Local facilities Doctors, Dentist, the Centre, Shop, Indian restaurant

There was also an apparent consistent trend with regard to the <u>areas of concern</u> in Mawsley. By far, with over 90%, inconsiderate PARKING is the number 1 issue, followed closely by poor MOBILE PHONE coverage and reliable BROADBAND speed. Anecdotally it is understood that a significant number of Villagers work from home so these two issues would be very important.

Included and other areas of concern are :-

- Parking
- Mobile Phone coverage and broadband
- Lack of a circular path/cycle way around the village
- Roads not being adopted
- No Pub
- Lack of other shops
- Speeding
- Threat of further development
- No activities for teenagers
- Lack of suitable housing for the elderly
- Limited bus service
- Care of Public Open space
- Post box location



There appears to be NO SUPPORT FOR FURTHER HOUSING DEVELOPMENT. The general view is that Mawsley has already been overdeveloped and is much larger than originally planned. This is putting too much strain on the school, facilities and adds to the parking problem according to a significant number of respondents.

It is apparent that many people moved to Mawsley, as a new village, for what it was and not what they wanted it to be developed into.

There seems to be a demand for more suitable housing for the elderly, especially bungalows and sheltered housing /gym which is being suggested for the Pub site (if the site is never going to be developed as a Pub/ Restaurant, which appears likely).

More than 20 respondents suggested that, if necessary, additional housing could be placed on the field between the two entrances.

Less than 5 respondents suggested that the land off Cransley Rise could be developed, but only if that allowed for the circular path/cycleway to be completed.

With regard to changing 'one thing in the village' the following points were popular:-

- Adopt the roads
- Complete the cycle path
- Review Article 4 restrictions
- Build pub restaurant
- More shops in the empty units in Barnwell Court

In the case of the Centre development the following main points were prevalent :-

- More facilities for older people i.e. bingo, whist, bridge.
- Expand bar area to provide a "quieter" area
- Develop Patio area to provide more seating and Patio heating
- Generally more activities at centre
- Regular Farmers market/local producers' stalls

As the Parish Council enters into the next phase of consideration and consultation we would welcome any thoughts or comments from all interested parties in the Village.

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MID JANUARY 2017

Nature on Your doorstep – a stroll round Mawsley & District by Les & Paul (no dog, no wives just us two old boys).

The morning dawned misty, cloudy, gloomy, chilly (4° C), damp and stayed that way. We arrived at the car park adjacent to Brampton Valley Way at the site of Kelmarsh railway station.

We climbed the steps up to the track bed of the long since closed Northampton to Market Harborough railway. Opened in 1859 and closed to passenger traffic in 1960 and finally fully closed in 1981. Now a recreational path for cyclist and walkers.



Despite the gloomy conditions the track side hedgerows were full of activity from the off. Thrushes including Fieldfares, Redwings and Blackbirds were feeding greedily on the ripe red berries. Coal tits roaming through looking for food. Wrens criss-crossed our path. Interestingly one of our most familiar songbirds, the tiny bird is both pugnacious and restless. Many books describe the Wren as being secretive but, while it is often overlooked they certainly did not hide themselves away from us. The Wren population is at something of a peak at the moment, thanks to a run of mild winters which have boosted overwinter survival. Cold winters can reduce the breeding population by a quarter or more.

As we walked we identified sites or one enormous site of a badger set in the embankment. Judging by the amount of scrapes in the surrounding grass, paths leading in all directions and holes in the bank there must be a large population here. The digging is caused by the badgers eagerly searching for a tasty meal typically earth worms.

The old route of the railway here follows the bed of the River Ise and crosses it several times. The Ise rises from a number of springs in the hills to the south west near Kelmarsh and Naseby and joins the Nene in the Wellingborough area. This river is an important nature corridor for a large number of birds and animals. The upper reaches, along with some of the tributary streams are home to rarer species such as whiteclawed crayfish, water voles and otters.

After a mile or so we reached the site of Clipston and Oxenden station. Now, virtually unrecognizable as a station apart from the station cottages. Turning right we took the peaceful lane to Arthingworth now closed to traffic apart from farm vehicles.

With the fields either side featuring uncultivated strips the area is clearly a haven for wildlife. Much to our surprise we heard a female Tawny owl call from a stand of high trees, unfortunately we were not able to spot her. According to reports this is a relatively common occurrence especially between the hours of 10am and 3pm. The jury it seems is out on as to a clear reason why.



Once through Arthingworth we followed the road in the direction of Kelmarsh back to the car park. The walk was about 4 miles and easy going. Pub on route is the Bulls Head Arthingworth.

I will make sure I return to the route Paul and I took in the summer, when the countryside promises to be verdant and brimming with life.

At this time of year, though, there is great appeal in seeing the bare leaved trees forming such patterns in the mist. Not much colour to speak of.

For that we had to return to the village, where there is a striking show of yellow coming from two plants in particular one a shrub and the other a climber. The former is *mahonia japonica*.



Believe it or not, the scented flowers on this plant attract a type of bumble bee even now. And in so many other respects, this is a shrub that ticks all the boxes.

It grows in almost any soil, partial shade or sun,any aspect and attractive black berries are produced which blackbirds relish.

If the plant gets too tall, it can be cut back ruthlessly without much set back to future flowering and growth.

One down side; the hard evergreen leaves are quite spikey and sharp – nothing that a good set of gardening gloves can't cope with, however.

The second plant most people will recognise if they have spent many winters here. This climber is the winter jasmine (*J nudiflorum*). Very noticeable because the yellow flowers produce a splash of colour from November through to February. Easy to grow and establish (ideal over arches and porches) though it might need help in supporting itself since it is not a true climber. Finally, a mention of that plant icon which signals the imminent arrival of spring.



Snowdrops are appearing on the banks and roadsides of Harrington and, if you're lucky, in your own garden.

I wonder if the sap is stirring yet If wintry birds are dreaming of a mate If frozen snowdrops feel as yet the sun And crocus fires are kindling one by one: Sing robin sing I still am sore in doubt concerning Spring. Christina Rosetti

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

Well, the Allotments issue has certainly started a lively debate! Around 50 villagers came to the January Parish Council meeting to make sure their views were known; and yes it was a lively debate.

The Council has to acknowledge that we underestimated the strength of opposition, both to the provision of allotments within the village per se; and certainly to the proposed site. And in acknowledging this we also apologise for not managing the process as well as we should have done.

We decided to go back to square one and start the whole process again; this time by forming an Allotment Working Group comprising two Parish Councillors; a member of the Allotment Society; and a representative from those opposed to allotments. Full details of the Group's remit are on our website. The Group will report to the Council, who will then make the final decision.

It cannot go unsaid however that it is extremely disappointing to note that a number of people who posted their views on FaceBook were unable to do so without being offensive and / or abusive. Perhaps they should simply grow up; but as the posts were immediately removed by the Moderators it was also a complete waste of "effort".

Moving on I would like to give thanks to Vic Cope for all the work he has done for the village as a Parish Councillor, particularly with regard to the Centre. Vic has now resigned as a Councillor – but not from the many other things he does for the village – so that means there is a vacancy. I simply add that if you want to influence the way in which the village develops, and the way issues are addressed etc., then now is your chance. And at the risk of venturing into the fraught world of the politically correct, the younger you are the better.

I can advise you that the Parish Council has made no change to the precept for next year. The precept is the source of Parish Council funds; the Borough Council no longer makes a grant to parish councils. Although collected via your council tax bill all of this precept is returned to Mawsley.

Finally, The Council has obtained an interest-free loan to enable us the change the lights at the Centre to LEDs. The original fittings were failing at an alarming rate, and proving costly to replace; but more pertinently LEDs will save c. £1,800 each year in electricity costs. I'm now considering the lights in my house!

Those who have particular concerns, for example with asthma, their back, or neck, receive personal attention from Lynn who adapts the exercises to suit each individual. weight of your own body and limbs. Therefore, it is easy to practice your favourite exercises at home. Age or gender is not a concern although at present it is mainly females who attend the class ranging

We have been attending the class for around a year and feel the benefit of having improved posture,

THE PATH ROUND THE ECO FIELD
